# Colorado Kinship Alliance

- Made up of DCW staff, county departments of human/social services, community stakeholders and kinship caregivers
- Meets quarterly the third Tuesdays in January, April, July and October
- An opportunity to provide input on rules, forms, etc.; networking; obtain updates and resources from various programs and key stakeholders, etc.

Permanency

Achieve permanency more quickly through:

- Benefits such as foster care maintenance
- Eligibility for assistance agreements (both adoption and RGAP)

Develop a practice — guide for working with kinship families

# Kinship Adoption Program

- Initiated in 2011, with the first adoption occurring in 2012.
- 59 children/youth within 42 families have obtained permanency through adoption using this program.
- Children and youth served range in age from 2 to 18.
- Relationship to children/youth: grandparents, great grandparents, aunts & uncles, great aunts & great uncles, a cousin, a sibling and a non-relative kin.
- Must live in one of 7 Metro Denver counties
- Must be a citizen of the United States or lawfully present
- Must be a relative of or have a significant relationship with the child or youth
- ❖ Must be willing to make a long-term commitment to the child or youth
- ❖ Must have been caring for the child or youth for the last 12 months or more

#### Other eligibility criteria include:

- ❖ No current child welfare involvement or pattern of child welfare involvement
- The adoption cannot be contested by more than one parent
- ❖ Household income may not exceed 200% of the Federal Poverty Level
