The need continues...

As of 2023 over 319,766 children in Georgia lived in a home with a relative other than their parent. (see Grandfacts state fact sheet for Georgia)

Our service area encompasses the entire state of Georgia for advice and counsel. We provide direct representation in the 5-county metro-Atlanta area.

In 2023, we were able to provide assistance to over 722 children in our metro-Atlanta area.



GRANDfamilies Kinship Care at Children's Service Society of Utah supports kinship caregivers and children by providing inclusive support services in collaboration with trusted community partners to build safe, stable, and resilient kinship families.

History of GRANDfamilies

- Established in 2002 as the first kinship support program in the State of Utah, serving Salt Lake County
- Opened offices in 7 additional counties from 2012 to 2024
- Began offering virtual services statewide in 2020
- Funding for the GRANDfamilies program comes from Title IV-E, Utah State Legislature, other grants/contracts, and private donations



Free services offered:

- Case Management (Intakes, referrals, team meetings, family mediation)
- Psycho-Educational classes for Adults, Adolescents, and Children
- Friend 2 Friend monthly events
- Short-term clinical services, clinical referrals

Psycho-Educational Classes







- 10-Week session, one 1 ½ hour class each week, 4 sessions per year
- 3 separate groups for Caregivers, Adolescents (12-18), Children (4-11) all held in the same building at the same time
- Curriculum written by CSS GRANDfamilies staff and facilitated by Clinical Therapist and Family Advocates
- Combination of kinship education and support group through discussion

2006

- HCC Founded To Meet Caregiver Needs
- Resource Referrals & Support Groups
- Mitchell, Avery, Watauga, & Wilkes Counties

2019

- Transition to Stand-Alone Non-Profit
- Launched Kinship Navigation Program
- Year-End: 45 Children, 26 Caregivers

2022

- Expanded into Ashe & Yancey Counties
- Catalyzed Youth Focused Programs
- Year-End: 213 Children, 163 Caregivers

2023

- Added 2nd Site: Kinship Korner
- Increased Focus on Counseling Needs
- Year-End: 385 Children, 304 Caregivers


The number of caregivers supported by High Country Caregivers


