- 5-year (2021-2026) cooperative agreement with Administration for Community Living

Fund Development

- ➤ **To be competitive** in the large nonprofit field, it is important to identify potential sources of income, strategies to secure funds, and tools to solicit such funding.
- Fund development is "the ongoing strategic positioning of an organization to sustain and grow its resources by building relationships with those who understand and care about the organization's relevance to the community." (Third Sector New England)



Stages of Fund Development

Stage One: Cultivation

Identifying and building relationships with potential donors & telling prospects about the agency

Stage Two: Solicitation

Participating in one-on-one solicitation through personalized direct mail and/or telephone solicitations

Stage Three: Stewardship

➤ Thanking donors through letters, recognition activities, and updates from the agency

- Personalized Donor Experiences provide customized communications to align with donor preferences.
- **Digital Fundraising Platforms** are essential for streamlining donation processes.
- Artificial Intelligence (AI) and Data Analytics analyze donor data to predict giving patterns and optimize communication strategies.
- Generational Leadership Shift is noticeable as younger generations take on nonprofit leadership roles.
- Impact Investing connects financial returns with measurable social or environmental benefits.

More Funding Interest Trends - Formats

- > Storytelling and Video Marketing use storytelling to showcase the human impact of your work.
- > Virtual and Hybrid Events find inclusive ways to engage a wider audience.
- Focusing on Donor Privacy and Data Security requires nonprofits to implement more robust data protection. Collaborative fundraising and partnerships between nonprofits, businesses, and other organizations can amplify impact and maximize shared resources for broader reach.
- > Sustainability and Circular Philanthropy drive donors to fund projects promoting sustainability and eco-friendly initiatives.





Importance of Partnerships

- Strategic partnerships are desirable to most funders
- You can leverage grant dollars for maximum benefit to targeted constituents
- Strategic partners can improve outreach efforts, expand advocacy, and enhance programs and services



Sources of Giving



- Individual the greatest source of nonprofit funding
- Federated nonprofit 'umbrella' organization which in turn distributes contributed funds
- Civic/Social/Service examples include sororities, fraternities, service clubs
- Bequests the transfers of wealth that occur upon a donor's death
- Annual Signature Events great for unrestricted funds

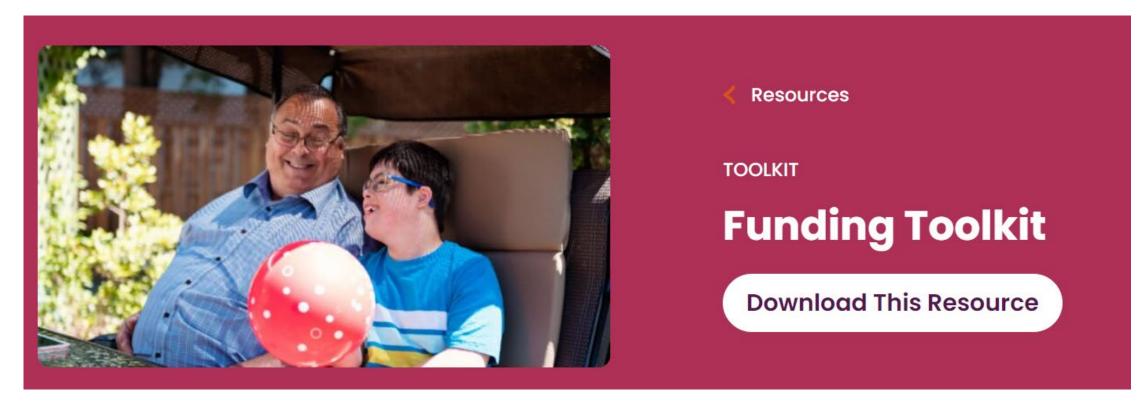

Reframing Federal Funding for Kinship Services

- Think beyond traditional child welfare and older adult funding sources
- Every issue is a kin issue that deserves a kin solution



Community Services Block Grant (CSBG)

- > Flexible funding to address causes and conditions of poverty
- Distributed through Community Action Agencies
- Funds a wide array of services from housing assistance to health services, to support groups, to community economic development



Victims of Crime Act (VOCA)

- > Funding for state and local programs supporting victims of crime
- Distributed through designated State Administering Agencies
- Funds a wide array of services to help address the physical, emotional, and financial impacts of crime



1890 Institution Teaching, Research and **Extension Capacity Building Grants Program**

- Competitive grants to help land grant institutions offer quality education and research
- Focused on agricultural and related issues to enhance quality of life for underrepresented communities
- Only land grant colleges and universities are eligible to apply, but they can partner





Partnerships for Federal Funding

- **Partnerships with intermediary entities:**
 - Area Agencies on Aging
 - Community Action Agencies
 - **State Administering Agencies**
 - **Local Education Agencies**
- Partnering for restricted competitive grants

Steps it takes to get funding as a small nonprofit



Strategy & Planning

The right **mindset** when it comes to funding - Understand that money is abundant and there is enough money to go around. Your size doesn't dictate your impact or your ability to be successful.

A realistic **budget** - A budget details your goals in numbers, and helps you strategically chart your growth. Your budget identifies your needs and gives you "permission" to pursue it.

A case statement - You need to make a strong case for why your organization should be funded. Use a case statement to help make compelling asks.

A fundraising/development **plan** - You need a realistic plan that details the fundraising strategies you want to focus on, the people responsible for taking those actions, and the associated timelines.





Effective Fundraising for Small, Peer-Led Nonprofits

- Peer-to-peer fundraising
- Local, communitybased grants
- Corporate support





Actions You Can Take Today



- > Set a goal and write it down
- Identify one fundraising strategy you want to leverage
- Develop a case statement for your organization



Implementation: Important Elements You Need

- > Committed and engaged **board** that understands their fundraising role
- > Volunteers who can help execute fundraising strategies
- > Technology to make your work more efficient
- > Consistent marketing that tells the story of your nonprofit

Partnerships for Small Nonprofits

- Smaller and peer-led nonprofits can play in the big sandbox
- Remember that you have special expertise to offer to larger nonprofits and government agencies
- Even larger organizations that submit proposals for Federal grants need an array of partners to substantiate that they have the subject matter expertise and capacity for developing and implementing a complex initiative
- Their connections and partnerships with peer-led programs and those with "boots on the ground" in local communities are vital to their success





Items You Need to Prepare for Funding

- Operational and program budgets
- Program information and outcomes
- > Strategic Plan
- > Financial statements, 990 form

- ➤ Documentation certificate of formation, 501(c)(3) letter, bylaws, board policies
- Capability statements
- Board of director list
- > Charitable solicitation



Actions You Can Take Today

- ➤ Create a funding readiness checklist
- ➤ Ask your board to commit to giving
- >Set up folders to house important documents
